SRI LANKA ABOARD THE 'VICEROY SPECIAL'

- the natural wonders of Sri Lanka aboard your private train -

Monday 19 January to Tuesday 10 February 2026







Sri Lanka is a beautiful tropical island the size of Tasmania, next door to India. Set in the Indian Ocean in South Asia, the tropical island nation of Sri Lanka has a history dating back to the birth of time. It is a place where the original soul of Buddhism still flourishes and where nature's beauty remains abundant and unspoilt. Few places in the world can offer such a remarkable combination of stunning landscapes, pristine beaches, captivating cultural heritage and unique experiences within such a compact location.

Boasting eight UNESCO World Heritage Sites, 1,330 kilometres of coastline, 15 national parks showcasing an abundance of wildlife, nearly 500,000 acres of lush tea estates, 250 acres of botanical gardens, 350 waterfalls, 25,000 water bodies, and a culture that extends back to over 2,500 years. Once known as Serendib, Taprobane, the Pearl of the Indian Ocean, and Ceylon, Sri Lanka was a valued British colony. Its 20 million inhabitants speak English, and the island offers an authentic Indian experience without the crowds.

The island has a wonderful broad-gauge colonial-relic railway system still very much as the British left it, none of it electrified. The railway reaches the highest summit anywhere in the world for a 5ft 6in broad gauge railway at an impressive 6228 ft (1900 m). We plan to cover much of the rail network with our own private "Viceroy" train.

The tour also features cultural highlights and natural wonders, with the amazing bird life and nature reserves boasting elephants and other large animals. A combination of culture, nature and railways. The dates of our tour should see cooler temperatures and the least rain for the island.

Our twenty-one day tour is, we believe, the most comprehensive and comfortable way to explore Sri Lanka - it is designed to enable you to experience the beautiful scenery of the country, immerse yourself in the culture of Sri Lanka, as well as to enjoy the ambience and facilities of the excellent hotels we have selected for our journey. You will leave amazed at the diversity and beauty of the country.

Monday 19 January 2026 – Australia to Colombo, Sri Lanka

There is a range of flight options to Sri Lanka, and we'll provide details. You can fly from Australia to Colombo today, with a transit Singapore, or depart the prior day on either a direct flight to Colombo, or with an overnight stay in Singapore. Colombo has been a flourishing seaport for centuries when ancient seafarers traded in pearls, precious stones, elephants, peacocks, cinnamon and other spices.

Today Sri Lanka's commercial capital is a fascinating blend of the East & West, the past and present and the old & new.... due to its large harbour and its strategic position along the East-West sea trade routes, the city of Colombo was known to ancient traders 2,000 years ago. Made the capital of the island when Sri Lanka was ceded to the British Empire in 1815, and its status as capital was retained when the nation became independent in 1948. In 1978, when administrative functions were moved to Sri Jayawardenepura Kotte, Colombo was designated as the commercial capital of Sri Lanka. Transfer to our hotel - a classy colonial-style building with a wonderful seafront terrace from which to watch the sun sink into the sea. Depending upon your time of arrival, enjoy a refreshing swim or stroll along the promenade. Relax in the late afternoon on the edge of the ocean and ovvernight Galle Face Hotel, Colombo.

Tuesday 20 January 2026 (B/D) – highlights of Colombo (markets and monuments)

Today we tour Colombo – visit Colombo Fort, the main railway station - experience the vibrancy of a busy Sri Lankan station, and then visit Pettah – Colombo's leading bazaar district. Visit the fresh food markets which will be eye opening, and then to the peaceful Viharamahadevi Park (Victoria Park) and Independence Square. View the Geoffrey Bawa designed Parliamentary Buildings at Sri Jayawardenepura Kotte. Visit the Colombo Museum housed in a grand colonial building, or explore at leisure, wander the waterfront, or visit nearby shops. At our lovely hotel enjoy a swim overlooking the ocean, a refreshing drink as the sun sets, then a Welcome Dinner is included at the hotel and overnight Colombo.





Wednesday 21 January 2026 (B/L/D) - Colombo and by rail to Galle

A mid-morning departure from the hotel provides for a relaxing breakfast, before we transfer to Colombo Fort Station to join our private train to Galle. Our luggage remains aboard the coach, as we join the train and taste our first Sri Lankan luncheon served aboard our private train. The Viceroy Special train has two air-conditioned observation/saloon cars and a non air-conditioned restaurant car in between. With plenty of space aboard you can stretch out, change seats, move around the train, and enjoy views from the rear observation car. The restaurant car will supply meals when we are aboard for lunch, and morning and afternoon tea also. Our journey south is a lovely ride through the palm-tree plantations south of Colombo, with the sea on our right. On arrival in Galle we enjoy an afternoon city tour. Galle exports rubber, tea, rope, coconut oil, and coconut fibre. The city also has a seaport that was very significant at the beginning of the 16th century when Portuguese were occupying most of Sri Lanka, as well as under the rule of the Dutch. In the 19th century, the British developed the Colombo seaport and the use of the Galle port declined. More than any other aspect of Galle, the history of this beautiful city is the most intriguing. Here you will find untouched ruins from the Portuguese and Dutch eras. The magnificent Dutch fort was declared as a World Heritage Site by UNESCO, as the history of the town goes to King Solomon's time. It was believed that Galle is the ancient seaport 'Tarshish', from where King Solomon transported ivory and other loot. The history of it holds stories of the times when Persians, Arabs, Greeks, Romans, Malays and Indians did their trading through the Galle port. Then head to the impressive Geoffrey Bawa designed hotel for two nights - the ocean front Jetwing Lighthouse Hotel, Galle. Enjoy a swim, drink and dinner overlooking the ocean.







Thursday 22 January 2026 (B/D) - to Matara, Dondra and sea turtles

This morning we join our coach and head to Dondra. Located 6 km east of Matara, Dondra is the southernmost point of Sri Lanka. A 40m high lighthouse was built in 1890 to provide guidance to the shipping route south of Sri Lanka. The sea bordering town of Matara is 160 km from Colombo with the River Nilwala running through the town to meet the sea. Matara's history dates back to the Anuradhapura period. The temple that lies in the middle of town was built by ancient kings and now holds a sacred place among the Buddhists in the area. The 16th and the 18th centuries saw the rule of the Portuguese and Dutch in that order. During the Dutch rule the 'Star Fort' was built and the original structure exists today. We visit a sea turtle farm and hatchery at Habaraduwa and learn of the steps being taken to protect these small creatures from extinction. Return to our hotel and dinner together overlooking the ocean. Overnight Galle.







Friday 23 January 2026 (B/L/D) - Galle to Mt Lavinia

After a relaxing breakfast we head to Galle Station for a late morning departure aboard the T1 Rail Car or Viceroy Train for the journey through the palm tree lined coast to Mt Lavinia. Enjoy luncheon aboard the train as we enjoy the palm fringed coast on the left. On arrival at Mt Lavinia we walk the short distance to our hotel. Famed for its golden mile of beach, its historic Mt Lavinia Hotel is perched on the edge of the coast with stunning ocean views. A look back at the days of colonial presence, the hotel commands splendid views over the ocean and is a great location for a relaxing afternoon, a swim, drink and then dinner together. Overnight Mt Lavinia Hotel.





Saturday 24 January 2026 (B/L/D) - Mt Lavinia to Pinnawela Elephant Orphange and Kandy

After breakfast we place luggage on the coach, then return to Mt Lavinia Rail Station to join the Viceroy Special. Departing north we pass the suburbs of Colombo, almost under our Colombo Hotel, then through Colombo Fort Station. The train has two air-conditioned observation/saloon cars, one on each end, and a non air-conditioned restaurant car in the middle. With plenty of space aboard you can stretch out, change seats, move around the train, and enjoy views from the rear observation car of the countryside through which we are passing. The restaurant car will supply our meals when we are aboard for lunch, and morning and afternoon tea are also provided. A bar provides a range of cool drinks, beer and wine. You can enjoy sitting at the dining car table with the windows open enjoying fresh air as we travel. Enjoy luncheon aboard enroute to Rambukkana. Here we leave the Viceroy Train to visit the impressive Elephant Orphanage at Pinnawela - this 24 acre large elephant orphanage is also a breeding place for elephants and has the greatest herd of elephants in captivity in the world. Rejoin the Viceroy Train as we climb and head north-east to the hillside city of Kandy. On leaving Rambukkana, the Kadugannawa Incline begins, where the train climbs 430 metres in 20 kilometres, often on a ledge of rock cut out of the hillside with some dizzy-making views.









Kandy is the hill capital of Sri Lanka, and comes complete with a romantic lake much loved by the British, with an agreeable climate due to its altitude of 500m. Kandy was the last bastion of the Sinhala kings and is a charming city offering a living record of a magnificent past. Some say Kandy is the only other real 'city' in Sri Lanka, other than Colombo. The easygoing capital offers history, culture, forested hills and a touch of urban buzz. Whilst only 115 km inland from the capital, climatically it is a world away due to its altitude. Kandy fell to the British in 1815 after defying the Portuguese and Dutch for three centuries. Enjoy a late afternoon swim, pre-dinner drink, then dinner and overnight, Kandy.

Sunday 25 January 2026 (B/D) - Kandy sightseeing

After breakfast explore Kandy, including Kandy Lake – a lovely centrepiece to the town created in 1807 by Sri Wickrama Rajasinha, the last ruler of the kingdom of Kandy. Several small-scale local chiefs, who protested because their people objected to labouring on the project, were put to death at stakes in the lake bed. The island in the centre was used as Sri Wickrama Rajsinha's personal harem, to which he crossed on a barge. Later the British used it as an ammunition store and added the fortress style parapet around the perimeter of the lake. Peradeniya Gardens provide spectacles of extraordinary beauty and absorbing interest for any nature lover - dating from 14th century reign of King Vikrama Bahu III, Peradeniya is well known for it's large variety of plants, ornaments and creepers. The great lawns highlight huge tropical trees and variety of bamboo, and the Orchid House boasts more than 300 varieties of exquisite orchids. A spice garden gives you a first hand introduction to the trees and plants used for the traditional Ayurvedic medicine. The Dalada Maligawa (Temple of the Sacred Tooth Relic) is the most venerated place of worship for Buddhists throughout the world. Built in the 16th century this temple houses the sacred Tooth Relic of the Buddha brought to Sri Lanka from the Kalinga province in ancient India in the 4th century AD. Several buildings have been added to the temple complex by successive rulers, the latest being the Golden Canopy over the inner shrine where the Tooth Relic is placed. Enjoy a refreshing evening swim, dinner and overnight Kandy.

Monday 26 January 2026 (B/L/D) – from Kandy to Nanu Oya and Nuwara Eliya

After breakfast we join our special train from Kandy to Nanu Oya, and then transfer the short distance by coach to Nuwara Eliya - "the prettiest village in Sri Lanka". We enjoy lunch aboard as we climb through this very beautiful hill country. Situated at around 2000m above sea level and surrounded by lush tea plantations, Nuwara Eliya is the main hill resort of Sri Lanka and the heart of the tea industry. Once a pleasure retreat of the European planters the town is still very much an English town with many English style bungalows and buildings. The city was founded by Samuel Baker, the discoverer of Lake Albert and the explorer of the Nile in 1846. Many of the buildings retain features from the colonial period such as the Queen's Cottage, General's House, the Grand Hotel, the Hill Club, and the town's Post Office. Overnight at the Grand Hotel, Nuwara Eliya.





Tuesday 27 January 2026 (B/L/D) - through picturesque 'upcountry' to Badulla

We enjoy a scenic rail journey to Badulla and back, with luncheon served aboard as we ascend to the highest point on the Sri Lankan railways network. The train ride to the hill country is considered to be amongst the finest train journeys in the world. The rail track ascends from sea level to the summit level of 1900 metres at Pattipola, the highest point reached by a 5' 6" broad gauge main line in the world. A great train journey is all about the subtle shift in geography as the journey progress through narrow passages, mountains and valleys, meadows and forests, and waterfalls. The magnificent railway bridges and tunnels are remarkable feats of engineering in a bygone era. The mainline to Badulla takes a circuitous route in the hills through tea estates, pine forests and misty peaks passing picturesque waterfalls and hairraising precipices. It is recorded that it was no ordinary task building the upcountry line which traverses 46 tunnels and over towering dressed-stone piers which hold steel bridges that were formed in distant Glasgow and Liverpool. We return in the late afternoon to Nuwara Eliya for dinner and overnight.

Wednesday 28 January 2026 (B/L/D) – Nuwara Eliya to Kandy

We return today through the hill country to Kandy. You have the option to travel on the Viceroy Train, or by coach, with the latter providing the opportunity for a visit to a tea plantation and tea factory enroute. In Kandy we stay in the centre of the town, opposite the great lake, at the Queens Hotel, a simple colonial edifice of much heritage, providing a most convenient location for local shopping and a walk around the lake. Experience a local cultural dance performance before returning to the hotel for dinner and overnight at the Queens Hotel, Kandy.



Thursday 29 January 2026 (B/L/D) - Kandy to Habarana and Sigiriya

Join our private Viceroy Train and enjoy luncheon aboard as we head to Habarana, where our coach transfers us to our hotel at the base of the famed Sigiriya Rock Fortress. Our base for two nights, we visit three major sights – Minneriya Nature Reserve, Sigiriya Rock Fortress, and Dambulla Cave Temple. Overnight Sigiriya Village Hotel.

Friday 30 January 2026 (B/L/D) – Sigiriya Rock Fortress and Minneriya Nature Reserve

An early rise to visit Sigiriya - an ancient palace of historical and archaeological significance that is dominated by a massive column of rock nearly 200 metres high. As we are located at one of the closest hotels to Sigiriya, we have the opportunity to visit the site and walk to the peak in the cool of the morning, and before many other tourists arrive – the early start will be rewarded with a peaceful beginning and stunning views. According to the ancient Sri Lankan chronicle the Culavamsa, this site was selected by King Kasyapa (477 – 495 CE) for his new capital. He built his palace on the top of this rock and decorated its sides with colourful frescoes. On a small plateau about halfway up the side of this rock he built a gateway in the form of an enormous lion. The capital and the royal palace were abandoned after the king's death, and it was used as a Buddhist monastery until the 14th century. Sigiriya today is a UNESCO listed World Heritage Site. It is one of the best preserved examples of ancient urban planning and is the most visited historic site in Sri Lanka.








For those who do not wish to climb Sigiriya, and for those who do as well, we visit the nearby Sigiriya Museum which provides information and displays about the history of this extraordinary site. This afternoon visit the Minneriya Nature reserve - a park of 8890 hectares consisting of mixed evergreen forest and scrub and is home to Sri Lanka 's favourites such as sambar deer, leopards, monkeys, water birds and elephants. The park is an attraction to large numbers of Sri Lankan animals attracted to the grass fields and food and shelter of the parks forests. However the central historic feature of the park is the ancient Minneriya Tank (built in the 3rd century AD by King Mahasena). We explore the park in 4WD vehicles, and travel over unsealed, and at times bumpy, dirt paths. Dinner and overnight at the Sigiriya Village Hotel.

Saturday 31 January 2026 (B/L/D) – Dambulla Cave Temple, Polonnaruwa and to Batticaloa

This morning we visit Dambulla Cave Temple - a sacred pilgrimage site for twenty-two centuries, this cave monastery, with its five sanctuaries, is the largest, best-preserved cave-temple complex in Sri Lanka. The Buddhist mural paintings (covering an area of 2,100 square metres) are of particular importance, as are the 157 statues. The excavated shrine-caves, their painted surfaces and statuary are unique in scale and degree of preservation. The monastery also includes significant masterpieces of 18th century art, in the Sri Lankan school of Kandy. The rock of Dambulla is the centre of a Buddhist cave-temple complex established in the 3rd century BC and occupied continuously until today.





We rejoin our special train to enjoy luncheon aboard, before our stop to explore the key sights of the UNESCO world heritage site and the medieval capital of Sri Lanka - Polonnaruwa. The people of Sri Lanka are very proud of Polonnaruwa and the level of civilisation it shows their ancestors had attained. It was the capital of the country from 200 AD until 1300, when it was sacked by Indian invaders – today it is the best preserved of the ruined cities. The Sri Lankans invite you to appreciate the size of the site and what they call their hydraulic civilisation — the city was supplied with water channelled from the still-existing 2500 hectare reservoir known as the Sea of Parakrama. We also visit the Gal Vihara Rock Monastery - the most celebrated site in Polonnaruwa, with its gigantic rock sculptures which "may be placed among the chefs-d'oeuvre of Sinhalese art". Rejoin the Viceroy Special for afternoon refreshments enroute to Passekudah, Batticoloa. We stay two nights at the Passekudah beach resort, near Batticaloa. Passekudah is an exotic beach where you can walk on the wide sandy beaches 30 to 50 metres into the sea. Waves are almost non-existent, making the sea look more like a lagoon. Dinner and overnight Uga Bay Resort, Passekudah, near Batticoloa.







Sunday 1 February 2026 (B/L/D) -Batticoloa

Historically, Batticaloa is best known as the site of the first landing (in 1602) by the Dutch in Sri Lanka, and as the place where they established their first lasting foothold on the island by seizing the local fort from the resident Portuguese in 1638. As the principal east-coast settlement south of Trincomalee, "Batti" is one of Sri Lanka's most appealing but least-known larger towns, mainly thanks to its long years of isolation and turbulence during the civil war. Throughout the conflict, the town and surrounding area was a major flashpoint between Tamil Tigers and Sri Lankan Army forces, with the army controlling the town and the Tamil Tigers running their own parallel administration – complete with courts, police force and tax collectors – from the village of Kokkadicholai, a short drive south. As Indian journalist Nirupama Subramanian put it in Sri Lanka: Voices from a War Zone: "Technically, Batticaloa town came under the government ... That was by day. By night, the town took orders from the Tigers." The Tigers are now gone, and intriguing reminders of Batti's long colonial history can still be seen, while the mercantile hustle and bustle of the main commercial areas suggests a town now increasingly on the mend. The town's setting is magical, perched on a narrow sliver of land backed by the serpentine Batticaloa Lagoon and surrounded by water on three sides. We return to our resort in the early afternoon for luncheon, and then a relaxing afternoon in and around the resort. Overnight Uga Bay Resort, Passekudah.





Monday 2 February 2026 (B/L/D) – Batticoloa to Trincomalee

A relaxing day aboard the Viceroy train, with luncheon aboard, as we travel on an inland circuit from Batticoloa to Gal Oya and on to Trincomalee. We stay two nights at the Trincomalee beach resort. At Trinco, as it is called, we transfer to our luxury hotel on a secluded beach in Uppuveli, north of Trincomalee for an overnight stay near the water. Uppuveli is known for its soft, white sandy beaches, mixed with mineral-rich black sand unique to this coastal strip on the Indian Ocean. Knee deep warm shallow water spreads out hundreds of metres into the sea. Enjoy a swim in the hotel pool, evening drink and then dinner and overnight Trinco Blu hotel.



Tuesday 3 February 2026 (B/D) – Trincomalee

Trincomalee is one of the great natural harbours of the world - the fifth largest and considered the second best, and Admiral Lord Nelson described it as the finest harbour in the world when he visited the island in 1770. During the Second World War, it became the base for the combined East Asian Fleet of the Allied powers. The journey begins at the second largest natural harbor in the world. We explore the harbour mouth across the lagoon, settled amidst fourteen majestic mountains. We visit the Koneswaram Temple dedicated to the Hindu God Shiva, the shrine built by a South Indian King was destroyed by the Portuguese in 1622. The temple of a thousand columns was shoved over the cliff into the deep blue sea. Observe the magnificent view from Swami Rock and the famous Lovers Leap steeped in a romantic folktale. We'll saunter through Fort Fredrick, a well preserved Portuguese gateway constructed with the remnants of the destroyed Koneswaram Temple. Overnight Trinco Blu Resort, Uppuveli, Trincomalee.

Wednesday 4 February 2026 (B/L/D) – Trincomalee to Habarana, then to Anuradhapura

After breakfast we reboard the Viceroy train and travel to Habarana, where we rejoin our coach for the drive north west to the ancient city of Anuradhapura - another of the great ruined cities of Sri Lanka, and the capital before Polonnaruwa. Anuradhapura was the first capital of the ancient kingdom of Sri Lanka and founded around the 5th Century BC. The sacred city which spreads through approximately 100 acres (40 hectares) of land area is home to the ruins of huge stupas, monasteries, Buddha images, and colossal man-made lakes and ponds, hospital complexes, storied buildings and stone inscriptions that represent the advanced architectural, civil and hydraulic expertise of ancient Sri Lanka. The Sacred Bo-tree which was planted in 245 BC symbolizes the establishment of Buddhism in Sri Lanka. It is said to have been grown from a cutting taken from the original Bo tree under which Buddha attained enlightenment and is one of the oldest known trees in the world. We enjoy luncheon, a sightseeing tour, and then overnight Anuradhapura

Thursday 5 February 2026 (B/L/D) – north to Jaffna

Today we travel north, with luncheon served aboard, to Jaffna - the capital city of the Northern Province of Sri Lanka, and the administrative headquarters of the Jaffna district located on the peninsula of the same name. With a population of 88,000, Jaffna is Sri Lanka's 12th largest city. The area is slowly returning as a bastion of Hindu tradition, art and culture, after decades of war, emigration, embargoes and loss of life and property, that have deeply affected this historic Tamil town. The city is surprisingly green and leafy, with attractive palm-shaded colonial-era suburbs and beautiful temples and churches. We base ourselves for two nights in Jaffna at a one of the cities newest hotels – one of the signs of Jaffna's emergence from the period of isolation. Dinner tonight in the resort. Overnight Jaffna.

Friday 6 February 2026 (B/D) – Jaffna and Kankesanturai sightseeing

After breakfast board our coach for a day of sightseeing around Jaffna and Kankesanturai. A tongue twister even for Sri Lankans, the locals call it KKS. Like most places in the north, KKS has war associated with its identity. The story of displacement is the most poignant in this coastal area and towards the northern tip of Sri Lanka, but it is also an ideal base for forays to the idyllic islands just to the west, and trips along the coastline and lagoons of the peninsula. Overlooking Jaffna lagoon, sections of the vast complex of Jaffna fort (once one of the greatest Dutch forts in Asia) have been recently restored, though it remains largely in ruins. It was built in 1680 over an earlier Portuguese original, and defensive triangles were added in 1792 to produce the classic Vaubanesque star form. Tellingly, one of the first major buildings to be rebuilt after the 2002



ceasefire was Jaffna's Public Library. The earlier library was burnt down by pro-government mobs (some say forces) in July 1981, a destruction deemed a cultural attack by many Tamils – few acts were more significant in the build-up to civil war. Right next to Keerimalai springs is the Naguleshwaran temple. In fact, the springs are a part of this overall temple complex. This temple or kovil as the locals will call it is one of the five sacred spots dedicated to Lord Shiva in Sri Lanka. We'll enjoy a day of sightseeing and return in the mid afternoon to Jaffna for a swim, dinner and overnight accommodation.

Saturday 7 February 2026 (B/L/D) – to Ragama and Veyangoda

Today we enjoy our last journey on our special Viceroy Express train as we travel from Anuradhapura south to Veyangoda, with luncheon aboard. We farewell our Viceory Express train crew who have looked after us for the past few weeks. We transfer by coach the short distance to Negombo, for our last two nights in Sri Lanka. Known for its fishing industry and its sandy beaches, we enjoy an afternoon walk, or swim on the beach or at the lovely hotel pool, and then dinner overlooking the ocean. Overnight at the very attractive and comfortable Jetwing Blue Hotel, Negombo.

Sunday 8 February 2026 – (B/D) Negombo

Our final day in Sri Lanka provides an opportunity to relax at the Jetwing Blue Hotel on the edge of the ocean, or for some simple exploration of the nearby city of Negombo. Dotted around the city are a number of monuments that showcase the legacy of the Portuguese and Dutch Empires that once occupied the land. Negombo is also famous for its lagoon and golden sandy beaches, as well as restaurants and some local last minute shopping. We enjoy our final dinner together at the resort. Overnight Negombo.



Monday 9 February 2026 (B/) – to Australia

After a relaxing morning transfer to Colombo Airport (only 7km away) for a late morning flight back to Australia via Singapore. Transit Singapore for overnight flight to Australia. Alternatively you may wish to overnight at Singapore airport for a daylight flight back to Australia. You can also fly directly from Colombo to Sydney in the late evening.

Tuesday 10 February 2026 – arrive Australia

Those flying overnight from Singapore arrive Australia early morning, or late afternoon/early evening for those who stayed last night in Singapore, or who flew directly from Colombo.

ACCOMMODATION, MEALS AND OPTIONAL EXTRAS

Accommodation is in $4 - 4 \frac{1}{2}$ star hotels. In some locations the best available may not be 4 star, and in some locations we have selected superior hotels as part of the experience of the location. Most meals are included as shown — with breakfast included most mornings. Meals included are indicated as (B) Breakfast, (L) Luncheon and (D) Dinner. A few optional extras are available — indicated as (O) in the itinerary — which are not included and may be possible for additional cost if you so desire.
